Keynote speakers:

Professor Barry Carpenter (UK) : Barry is Associate Director (Special Educational Needs) with the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust .Within this role he acts as Director of the DCSF funded Project on Children with Complex Learning Difficulties. He is Honorary Professor at the University of Worcester, and a Fellow at the University of Oxford.



Professor Gail Furman (USA) Gail teaches Values and Ethics in Educational Leadership, Community and Communications, and Qualitative Research Methods at Washington State University. Her research interests include leadership and organisations, school as community, moral leadership and ethics. Gail is the past president of the University Council for Educational Administration and widely recognized for her work in educational leadership.



Professor Roger Moltzen (NZ): Roger is the Deputy Dean of the Faculty of Education at the University of Waikato. Roger brings expertise in intelligence and creativity; talent development across the lifespan; the education of gifted and talented students; and special/inclusive education.



Professor Patrick Duignan

(Aust): Patrick has been involved in education for almost 35 years as a teacher, deputy principal, principal and in a number of positions from lecturer to professor and Dean in tertiary education institutions. He is currently Foundation Chair in Educational Leadership and Director of the Flagship in Educational Leadership at ACU National. Patrick has a distinguished national and international research, publication, consultancy, and conference presentation record in the area of Management and Leadership.



Aroaro Tamati (NZ): Aroaro is founding whanau member and a current director of Te Kopae Piripono - an immersion Maori early childhood centre, based in New Plymouth. Aroaro has been involved in early childhood education for twenty years. In 2004, Te Kopae Piripono was named Centre of Innovation. A central focus of Te Kopae Piripono's research was the role of whanau and leadership, in young children's learning and development. She is a registered early childhood teacher and has a Master of Education Early Years degree.
